Hubert William Kimble

Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force

1889 - 1918



Hubert William Kimble was born in Swanbourne on 21st Aug 1889. He was the son of William Kimble (1863-1943) and Ann Eliza Grantham (1865-1939).

He went to Canada in October 1910 and lived in Lisgar, Manitoba in 1911 and 1916. He joined the army on 25th Oct 1917 and was killed at Vimy Ridge, France on 28th Aug 1918 age 29. He had not married.

The **1891 Census** for Hubert shows him with his parents and brother living in Hoggeston, Bucks:

1910 Passenger list to Canada: Hubert Kimble is listed as travelling on the Royal George, leaving Bristol on 13th Oct 1910 and arriving in Quebec. He is 21 and a railway labourer.

The **1911 Canadian Census** lists Hubert, lodging with the Jopp family at Lisgar, Manitoba, Canada. He is a Baptist, single, 21 and a farm labourer. He was born in England in August 1889 and immigrated in 1910.

He can also be found on the **1916 Canadian Census.** He is now living at 4,3,W1 Roland, Lisgar, Manitoba, Canada. He is a Baptist, single, 26 and a farmer. The other details are confirmed as above.

Attestation: Hubert joined the Army on 25th Oct 1917 at Winnipeg, Canada. He gives his residence as Ivy Cottage, Hoggeston, near Winslow and his father, William Kimble, as next of kin. His regimental number is 2173582 and he is single and a farmer.

Death: Hubert was killed on 28th Oct 1918. He was a private in the 52nd Battalion, Manitoba Regiment, Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force. He 'was a member of a Lewis gun crew and while in 'Lady's Lane' after the capture of Boiry he was killed by a shell'. The next of kin (his father), was informed on 2nd Nov 1918.

He is listed on the Vimy Memorial although his final resting place is unknown.
